

Steelworkers' Archives News Looking Back at 2020 and Forward to 2021



As 2020 began, the Steelworkers' Archives was off to a good start. Our regular Board and Membership meetings were held through March. Martha Capwell Fox, Historian and Archives Coordinator of the D&L and National Canal Museum, spoke about the Bethlehem Iron Company at our March 9 meeting. Thank you!

In early March, the City of Bethlehem Mayor's office contacted the Steelworkers' Archives, asking us to meet with Mayor Giuseppe Antonio Ruggiero of Bethlehem's Sister City Foiano di Val Fortore in Italy. Mr. Ruggiero is researching Italian immigrants who worked at Bethlehem Steel. On March 6, Les Clore and Susan Vitez met with Mayor Ruggiero (pictured far right), Giuseppe Faioli, and Mike and Maggie Picucci of Bethlehem at our office at Wind Creek to contribute to their research. The two Giuseppes were made honorary members of the Steelworkers' Archives.



Then came the pandemic! Due to COVID restrictions as well as lack of access to NCC, we have not been able to meet as a group since March, 2020. The Board of Directors continued to hold virtual bimonthly meetings to ensure that the Archives continued to function through 2020. NCC will not be hosting community groups during the spring semester and COVID restrictions remain in place, so we do not anticipate in-person membership meetings before Summer, 2021. Virtual board meetings will continue.

2020 was also an election year for the Archives. Under pandemic lockdown, we conducted a successful election through mail-in voting. Ballots were tabulated outside Union Hall by Board Chair Mike Dzwonczyk and Trustee Jeff Zettlemoyer on Monday, September 14, our regular meeting day. Fran Ferencin and Earl Kurtz, candidates for Vice President (the only contested office on the ballot), also attended. The officers elected to serve through September 2022 are: Joe Mayer, President; Fran Ferencin, Vice President; Tootie Ferencin, Secretary; and Jill Schennum, Treasurer. Congratulations!

STEELWALKER TOURS

In September, members of the Speakers Bureau convened on weekends at the National Museum of Industrial History (NMIH) Plaza for our *Memories of Steel* talking series in lieu of tours.

We resumed our *Steelwalker* tours on September 27, and they ran through December 27. With the Visitor Center and Hoover-Mason Trestle closed to the public, we reconfigured our tour format.

STEEPLES AND STEEL

Steelworkers' Archives was awarded a 2020 grant from Northampton County's Department of Community and Economic Development for our highly-regarded *Steeples and Steel* mini-bus tours. However, these summer and fall tours could not be held due to the pandemic. With input and approval from DCED, we repurposed our funding towards the *Last Cast 25* event, November 14 at the NMIH plaza. See below. LAST CAST 25

November 18, 2020 marked the 25th anniversary of the last cast of iron at Blast Furnace "C", the end of steelmaking in Bethlehem. Les Clore, Mike Dzwonczyk, Ed Leskin, Joe Mayer, Susan Vitez, and Don Young helped plan multiple virtual and in-person *Last Cast 25* events in partnership with NMIH, ArtsQuest, Bethlehem Area Public Library, PBS Channel 39, Wind Creek Bethlehem, Northampton County DCED, and Historic Bethlehem Museums and Historic Sites. The planning committee and subcommittees began meeting in 2019, then resumed meetings virtually in August. Thank you to all involved in planning and participating in *Last Cast 25*, including NMIH's Kara Mohsinger and Andria Zaia who are also Steelworkers' Archives members.

On November 12, Les Clore, Mike Dzwonczyk, and Don Young participated in *Last Cast 25: Steelworker Interviews* hosted by NMIH in collaboration with the Steelworkers' Archives. This 45-minute free virtual program informed about 200 students (from James Buchanan, Lincoln, Sacred Heart, Shawnee, Spring Garden, and Thomas Jefferson Elementary Schools) about personal stories of work at the mill and allowed them to ask Les, Mike, and Don questions about their careers at Bethlehem Steel. The moderator was Amber Emory.

In addition to the Steelworkers' Archives, *Last Cast 25* Education Committee event sponsors were National Museum of Industrial History, Banana Factory Arts Center, and Historic Bethlehem Museums & Sites.



CHILEAN MINES

On January 23, a webinar entitled Digging Up Bethlehem Steel's History in Latin America: Chile and Transnational Flows of Raw Materials and People was presented through the NMIH website. presentation was co-sponsored by the NMIH, the Southside Initiative and the Steelworkers' Archives. The bilingual presentation by Dr. Cory Fischer-Hoffman of Lafayette College and public historian Javier Rojas, explored Bethlehem Steel's iron ore mines in Chile, which operated from 1913 until 1971. These mines supplied iron ore, shipped through the Panama Canal to Sparrows Point, to many of BSCO's plants. In addition, Bethlehem Steel engineers, geologists, and executives worked on the Chilean mining projects, many bringing families to Chile, and Chileans back to the Lehigh Valley. This talk explored the history of Bethlehem Steel's iron mining operations in Chile, the transnational flows of raw materials and people, and Bethlehem Steel's legacy in Latin America.
